Scott Rosetti

Scott opened up his presentation describing the new look hats that he and his staff now here to avoid sun burn whilst on the job. Scott then wore the hat with aplomb! His point was to assure members of the responsible role he is taking with occupational health and safety. Scott then went to assure us that he may use the hat whilst in New York!

Scott is currently doing his masters degree at the RMIT. He is following the words of his grand father to play the field which he was able to do until he was married. He has one more year of study to go, of which he has to go to New York to complete his study further. He intends to be in Times Square for New Years eve so there with that hat.

He wishes to inform members that he is now a marriage celebrant. He is a council member of the Australian Funeral Directors Association. Scott proudly tells us that he is the Webmaster of the Sale Central Rotary Club web site Scrotary .dot com. His previous occupations were as an accountant with KPMG, electrician, and a radio announcer with an on air wine tasting show!

Scott's interests are family and renovating as he is renovating an old Hospital that many Rotary members were born in. He enjoys 4 weddings and a funeral so much that he often uses words out of that movie.

Guest Speaker: David Holland's /Marine Venture

David has just completed a course to become a captain of a ship up to 34m in length. This is something he has wanted to do for 20 years. To achieve this he lived on his boat for 5 months in Lakes Entrance. To become a master the trainee must have 900 days at sea. There are 42 modules that must be completed before being awarded the role of a captain. The course is set by Monash but it is monitored by the Launceston maritime college.

Sea deck is a new college just been built at Lake Entrance. It caters for the Eastern Seaboard of Australia, with most students from Vic, NSW and SA being represented.

The course requires the entrant to be a level 3 first aider and to have skills in radio operation.

The first week comprised pre-sea which was about doing all the emergency procedures such as fire drill, life rafts, - first aid, and abandon Ship in the Nth Arm at Lakes Entrance. During fire drill we all had to go over the side.

We had an upturned life raft for assistance, but with 16 men trying to upturn the raft was difficult.

We spent quite a lot of time in the heated pool at Lakes Entrance just preparing for this event. It was in May that we had to go into the sea. Part of the training is getting in the life raft and staying on the life raft for 8 hours fully clothed. We had to learn about the symptoms of Hypothermia, and keeping up good communication. Treating persons who were injured etc.

We were lectured by a psychologist about being able to cope in confined spaces. Another exercise was out at sea, 150m over the breakers and then we had to go swimming with boots, and clothes. To swim fully clothed with a life jacket is nearly impossible. When David got ashore he crawled up the beach as he was exhausted.

Another exercise was with fire training. The school had filled a room with smoke with a had a student lying prone on the floor. The rescuer has to crawl with approx 300mm room to get to the student.

Then we commenced the coxswain's course. This course is for any body that operates a boat over 40f in length. The course covered the rules of sea that are International.

The school had a room filled with computers for navigational training. The sea lights at night were another topic that was well covered. David found it difficult, particularly in fog. One night they went to Paynesville and blacked out the ship and sailed back to LE using radar only. One night we sailed back and forward for Lakes Entrance to Paynesville all blacked out all night.

We then spent 3 days at sea, sailing to Port Albert, to Clifty Island, back around Schnapper Platform, around cape Condon and back home. All this was an exercise in navigation and running a ship. This comprised cooking, first aid, health and hygiene,

We then went on to the next level which was navigating with radar, a week study maritime law, and the last one was stability for loading a vessel.
