This week is Youth Week.

One of the week's activities was MUNA, at which we were represented by 4 Students from Sale College. The countries which the students were to be representing were Iraq and Syria.

Our guest speaker was **Dick Noble from East Gippsland Group Training**. Dick told us how in recent years many changes have occurred regarding what students learn in school compared to the increasing amount learned out of school. Workplace learning is now the in thing. While VCE is the accepted course, it is really only suitable for University entrance, so the State Government has taken steps to re-introduce technical education by establishing the Certificate of Applied Learning during the last few years. Students can gain well deserved recognition for skills learned in community organizations such as Life Saving Clubs or Red Cross.

Courses are designed for students to do almost anything that is of interest to them while serving in the workplace. Many other avenues exist through **traineeships or apprenticeships**. **Primary teaching** is one career which can be successfully launched through a school based traineeship.

Agriculture is another course which lends itself to a traineeship, especially those who live on farms, because it makes it easier to meet the work requirement of 10 to 12 hours per week. The **hospitality** industry is another which suits this type of education and **McDonalds** have proved to be very helpful in this area.

Because Units in Year 11 can be gained through a traineeship, the workload of students in school can be lightened by timetable changes to allow them more time to pursue these courses. Because many schools have been hesitant to introduce workplace learning, this has led to the Federal Government becoming interested in establishing Technical Education in some regional centres. Sale/Bairnsdale has been selected for one of these colleges and when built will probably have components in both places, depending on the workplace needs of each area. The level of interest from industry at meetings so far has been low, but it is realized that many people in business prefer to leave educational decisions to the educators. If it can be demonstrated that there are skill shortages in certain areas, for example aviation or agriculture then courses could be established to cater for these needs. A steering committee will be incorporated next month and then will be formulating a proposal for the establishment of a Technical College. The Board will also recommend if a Greenfield site is the way to go, or whether there is a better way. It could well be that students would spend time each week at the Technical College, a Secondary College and with their employers.
